Four Different Regulators

Regulator	Says you are lobbying if you are trying to affect...	Requires
IRS	legislation at any level of government (incl. ballot initiative)	Public Charity must stay within lobbying limit & report lobbying on IRS 990
Federal Lobbying Disclosure Act	federal administrative or legislative action	Register & report if exceed threshold: \$14k/20% of an employee's time in a quarter
NYS CELG	NYS, or action by county or municipality pop. 5k+, regarding legislation, executive order, agency rule or regulation, procurement	Register & report if you hit \$5k expenditure threshold
NYC Clerk	NYC legislation, executive order, rule, regulation, procurement, zoning, land use	Register & report if you hit \$5k expenditure threshold

IRS Lobbying Limit (for public charities)

Two ways to calculate your limit:

- 1) Substantial Part Method
 - This is the default method
 - Problem – how much is too much?
- 2) Lobbying Expenditures Method
 - You get a precise \$ ceiling on the amount you can spend on lobbying, based on total expenditures



IRS Lobbying Expenditures Test

If exempt purpose expenditures are:	Organization can spend this much on lobbying:
≤\$500,000	20% of exempt purpose expenditures
>\$500,00 but ≤ \$1,000,000	\$100,000 + 15% of exempt purpose expenditures over \$500,000
> \$1,000,000 but ≤ \$1,500,000	\$175,000 + 10% of exempt purpose expenditures over \$1 million

- Organization with \$500k in expenditures in a tax year can spend up to \$100k on lobbying
- To use this test, file IRS Form 5768 (one-time, ½-page filing, no fee)

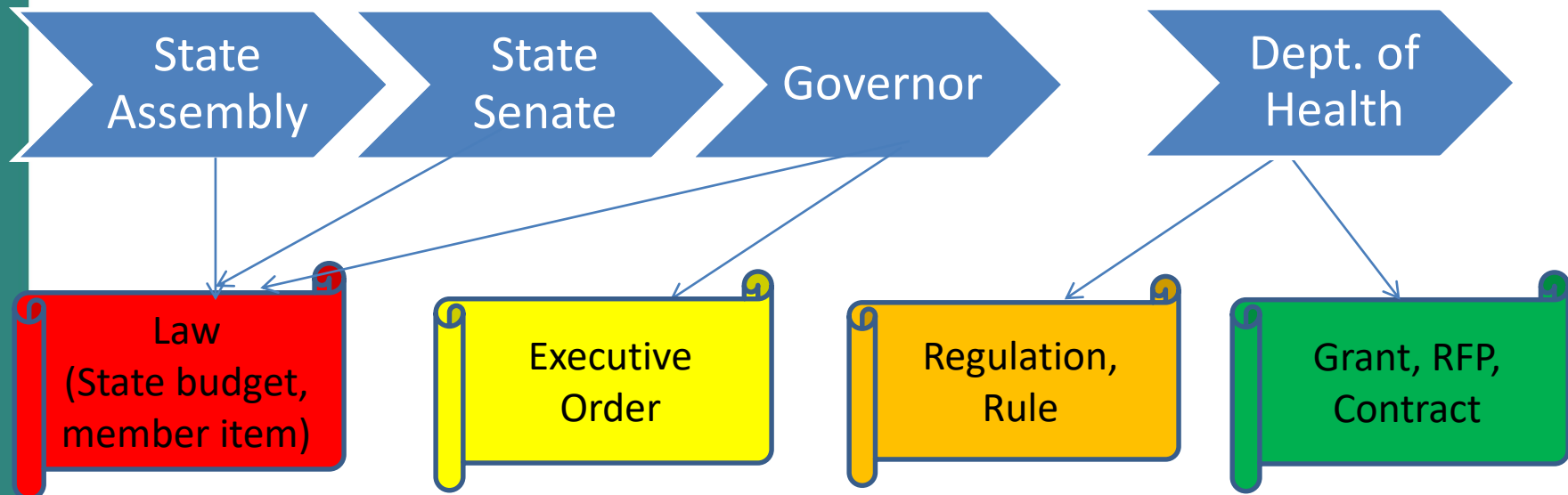


Activities to Track Because They May Be Lobbying

Attempting to influence:

- legislation (& introduction of legislation) – budget legislation, member items count!
- agency rules & regulations
- procurement

Regulators' View of the World





NYC

- zoning, land use, disposition of City's real property
- determination of Board or Commission
- hearings: It's lobbying if you're trying to influence...
 - Agency's decision to hold, or timing of, rate making proceeding
 - Agenda of Board or Commission
 - **Calendaring or scope of City Council oversight hearing**



Direct & Grassroots Lobbying

Direct Lobbying

Refer to specific legislation (or other government action) *and* take a position on it

Grassroots Lobbying

Encourage others to act by:

- referring to specific legislation (or other government action),
- taking a stand on it, *and*
- including a “call to action” that explicitly or implicitly asks the recipient to contact government officials



Things That Are Not Lobbying

- Communicating with legislator about something other than legislation
- Discussing legislation, agency rule etc. without an “ask”
- Responding to unsolicited written request from a legislative body
- Participating on the record in the public proceedings of a government agency
- Participating in formal government agency notice & comment process

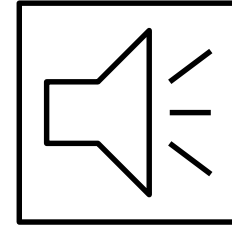
Seeking Government Funding

Activity	Is It lobbying?
Formal application: Submitting a grant application or responding to an RFP through a formal process	No
Budget item: Trying to influence inclusion of funding in the State or City budget	Yes
Member item: Contacting legislator about a member item is lobbying	Yes
Grants: Seeking to influence an agency's award of a grant or contract	Sometimes

Calculating Lobbying Expenditures

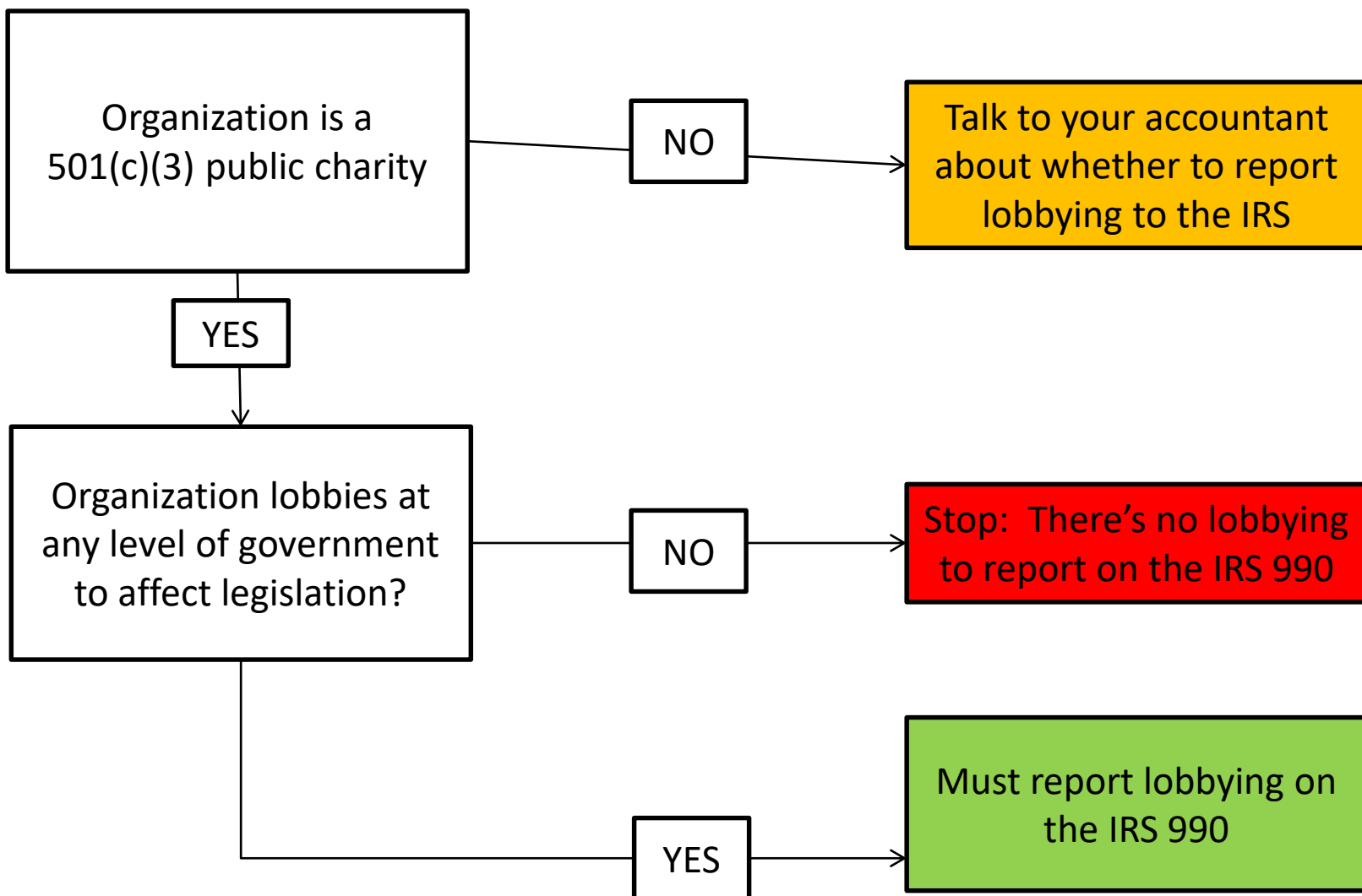
Organizer: $\$40\text{k}/\text{year} \div 2,080 \text{ hours}/\text{year} = \$19.23/\text{hour}$

Good Jobs campaign	20 hours
City Budget postcard campaign	<u>35 hours</u>
	55 hours

55 hours * \$19.23/hour	\$1,058 staff time
12% overhead	\$ 127
train & hotel	\$ 300
printing & mailing postcards	<u>\$ 500</u>
	\$1,984

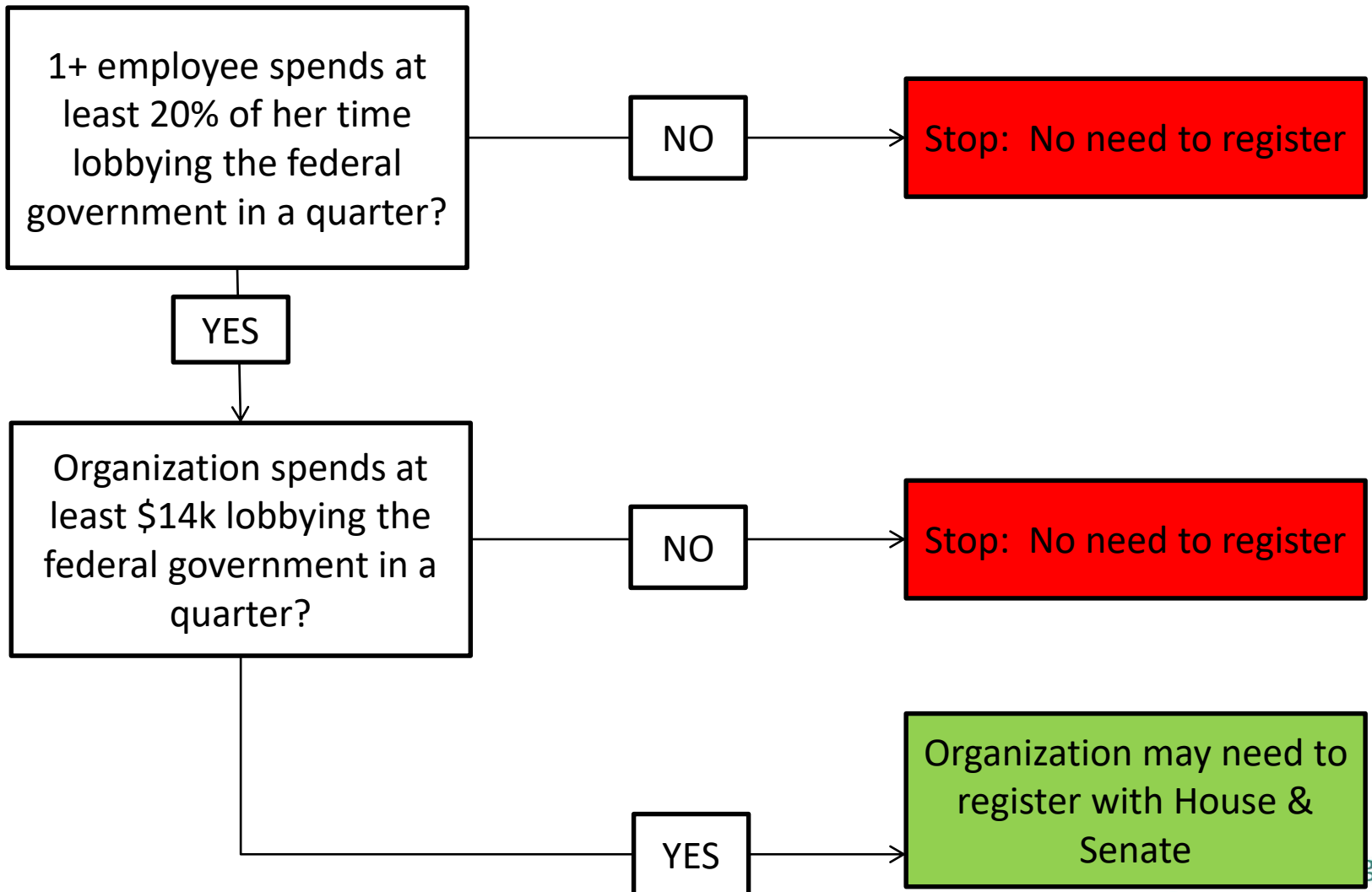


Step 1: Do you need to report lobbying to the IRS on Form 990?



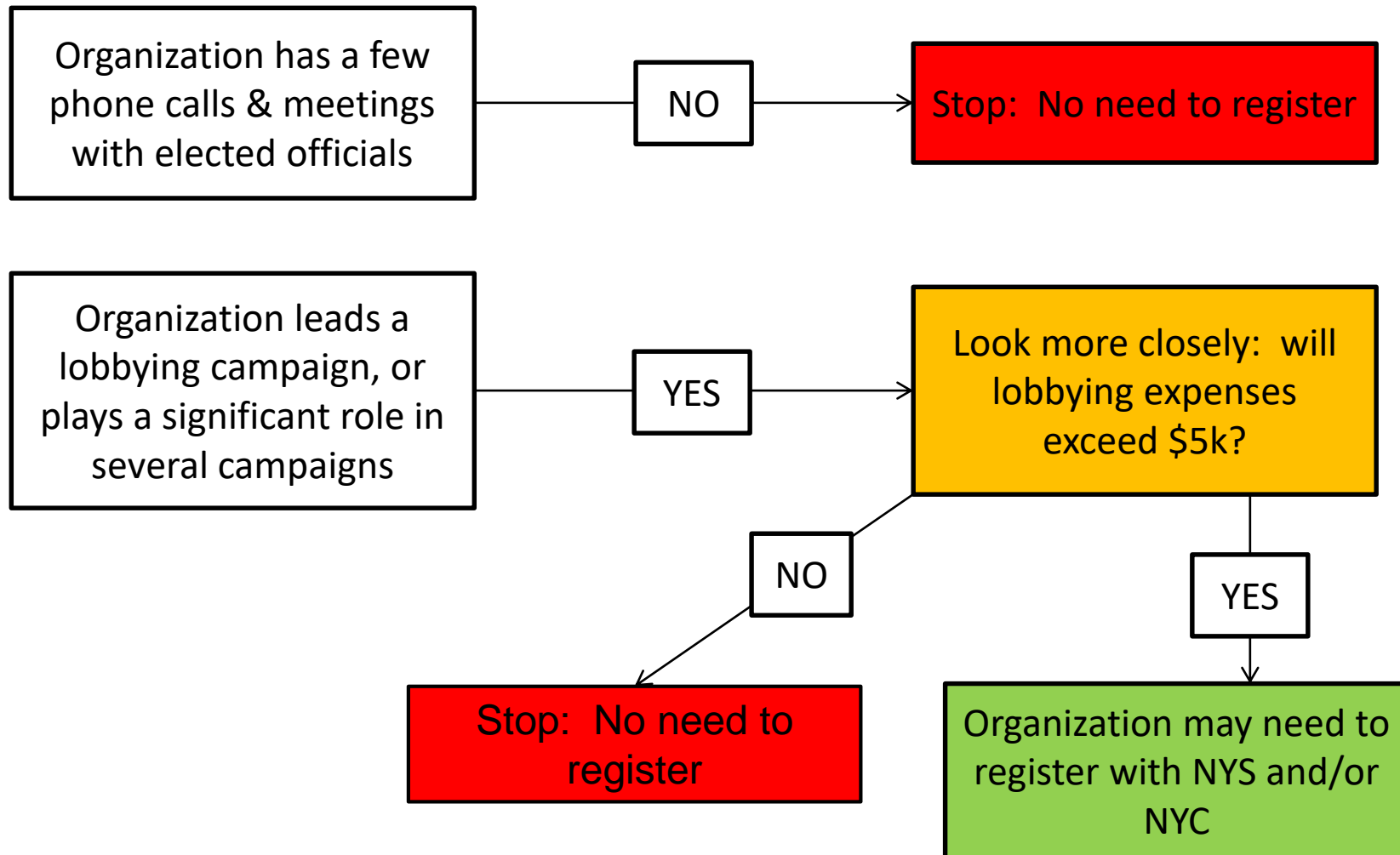


Step 2: Do you meet federal registration threshold?
