For nonprofits hosting summer or other "internships" for students, be clear as to whether or not the worker will receive or expects to receive any compensation, his or her purpose of working, and whether the nonprofit is offering a job or a volunteer experience. Generally, volunteers may receive reimbursement solely for minimal volunteer-related expenses.
